Key Concepts: Migration	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Red Cross have produced a toolkit called <i>Positive Images</i> that looks at a variety of issues around migration, including migration patterns and stereotyping. Key Concepts: Identities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> In the episode of Channel 4's <i>My Big Fat Gypsy Wedding, Boys Will Be Boys</i>, there is a young gypsy who has hidden her identity from her employer because she is afraid that they will sack her if they find out who she is. This situation acts as a good starting point for a discussion on identity, stereotyping and discrimination – as do many others from this series. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Citizenship PSHE 	My Big Fat Gypsy Wedding, Series 2 Episode 4, Boys Will Be Boys
Migration Histories: Black Romans Viking Legacy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Students look at the timeline of a history of Britain and then annotate a map to show where immigrants to Britain came from and when they migrated. Alternatively, they could be given jumbled information to sort. Show some or all of the 'Official Rewind DVD' video on the Rewind website to students and discuss the outcomes of the ancestry testing – are they surprised at the results? Migration Histories: Seeking Asylum	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Show students the City of Sanctuary video clip. Ask students what the movement aims to do, examples of how they support asylum seekers and how it works • If there is a City of Sanctuary movement in the area where your school is located, you could invite a representative to talk to students about its work in their area • Using the resources on the City of Sanctuary website, students plan how they would go about making their area a City of Sanctuary. Migration Histories: Fortress Europe	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>Europe and Me</i> is a resource that looks at a variety of issues around the European Union (EU). Unit 4 looks specifically at work and freedom of movement within the EU. • The clip from <i>The Poles are Coming</i> is a good starting point for a discussion about the issues of filling manual labour jobs and how migrants from Eastern Europe are filling the gap. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Citizenship • Geography 	Europe and Me Clip from The Poles Are Coming
Locations: Places of Refuge	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Red Cross have produced a lesson plan based around a photograph, which is a good starting point for discussing refugee camps • In groups, students work out all of the things that would be needed at a refugee camp (eg access to water, food, shelter etc). 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Identities & Cultures: Art identities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Show students a piece of artwork and ask them what it tells them about the artist's identity/what they think the piece is about. They could be provided with prompt cards, information or stories about the artist as a starting point. There are examples of artworks by migrant artists on the <i>Making the Connections</i> website Students produce a piece of artwork to reflect their own identity (this could link to the full lesson plan <i>Family Identities</i>). 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Citizenship Art & Design 	Making the Connections
